Diabetes Foot Health Access and Modernization Act Introduced (HR 7905/S 7040)

We launched a new legislative strategy for APMA's signature diabetes foot bill, securing bicameral, bipartisan House and Senate leads, including physician members of Congress and influential committee leaders.

Medicare Physician Payment Reform

- Elevated podiatry's voice in Medicare payment reform by helping shape payment reform legislation with physician members of Congress and national medical societies.
- Advocacy efforts led to unanimous House committee approval of the *Provider Reimbursement Stability Act (HR 8163)*.

Reducing Prior Authorization and Administrative Burdens

APMA advanced a comprehensive strategy to reduce prior authorization burdens by leading congressional advocacy for the *Improving Seniors' Timely Access to Care Act (HR 3514/S 1816)* while working with CMS and national stakeholders to improve implementation of the CMS WISer Model and reduce unnecessary administrative burdens on podiatric physicians.

Modifier Advocacy

- Engaged CMS to improve its guidance on 59 modifier, supporting accurate coding and fair reimbursement.
- In collaboration with state societies, engaged private payers to oppose restrictive modifier 25 reimbursement policies.



Advancing Parity and Modernizing Scope of Practice

Together, APMA and its state component societies are driving state advocacy victories that protect patients and advance the profession!

INTERSTATE COMPACT LICENSE

The Interstate Podiatric Medical Licensure Compact (IPMLC) reached an important milestone in 2026. Following months of advocacy by APMA, state component societies, and the Federation of Podiatric Medical Boards, two states passed the IPMLC:

- Maryland (#1)
- Iowa (#2)



SCOPE OF PRACTICE ADVANCEMENTS

- **Florida:** Protected podiatric physicians' access to cellular and tissue-based products through successful state advocacy.
- **Tennessee:** Modernized podiatric physicians' scope of practice to permit treatment of soft tissue distal to the tibial tuberosity.
- **Kentucky:** Expanded podiatric physicians' authority to supervise physician assistants.

Building Congressional Support for Podiatric Medicine

APMA Legislative Conference

APMA's two-day Legislative Conference, held in March, strengthened relationships with Congress and advanced the profession's federal advocacy agenda. More than 200 meetings with congressional offices—including 25 meetings with members of Congress—gave podiatric physicians a direct voice on Capitol Hill. The conference also featured seven bipartisan Members of Congress, including leaders from the GOP Doctors Caucus and Democratic Doctors Caucus, demonstrating APMA's strong congressional relationships and growing influence.

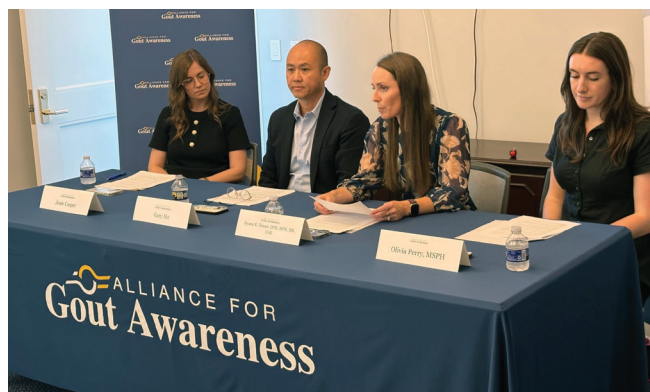


Congressional Briefings

APMA led and contributed to three congressional briefings that educated members of Congress and congressional staff on the important role of podiatric physicians in the health-care system.



Hosted a congressional briefing on therapeutic shoes for patients with diabetes and APMA's Diabetes Foot Health Access and Modernization Act, featuring APMA President Dr. DeHeer, congressional champions, clinical experts, and patient advocates.



Participated in the Gout Awareness Month briefing, with APMA Chief Medical Officer Dyane Tower, DPM, MPH, MS, CAE, highlighting the role of podiatric physicians in gout care.

Participated in a Congressional PAD Caucus briefing, with APMA Trustee David Alper, DPM, highlighting the role of podiatric physicians in the management of peripheral artery disease.
