

STEP UP FOR PODIATRY

- 1** Open an Internet browser. In the address bar, type apma.org/eAdvocacy to go to the eAdvocacy website.
- 2** REGISTRATION for the site is easy! Users may register with their Facebook account, **OR** simply complete the fields (name, address, email, etc.) and click “Submit” to be granted access to the site. **YOU DO NOT NEED TO USE FACEBOOK!**
- 3** After registering, scroll down to review APMA’s alerts, and click the issue to review and send a **prewritten form letter** that can be personalized and sent directly from the eAdvocacy website.

Users may choose to edit the prewritten message to include personal comments, or copy, paste, and print the letter on personal stationery using a word-processing program such as Word, then send it through regular mail. Note that regular mail will take weeks, because congressional mail is screened for harmful substances.
- 4** Select the drop down box to switch between members of Congress. Each message is individually editable.
- 5** If you are satisfied with the letter(s), click the “Send All Messages” box to send your messages simultaneously. It’s that easy!
- 6** The APMA eAdvocacy website is fully integrated with social media, so users can easily post about advocacy effort through Facebook, Twitter, LinkedIn, and Pinterest as well! The more advocates that take action, the greater the chances for success!
- 7** Don’t forget to take a moment to make a contribution* online to APMAPAC! Visit apma.org/Donate. APMA credits it’s legislative success to years of relationship building between APMA members and members of Congress, and to the generous membership support for the APMAPAC which strengthens the association’s legislative endeavors.
